As Mayors of municipalities along the Jersey Shore, we are committed to protecting our beaches and preserving the quality of life for our residents. We know you appreciate that the shore is a vital source of recreation, tourism, and fishing. Our communities are dependent upon keeping our beaches clean and safe.

That is why we are very concerned that a number of proposals for offshore wind transmission have been submitted to the New Jersey Board of Public Utilities (BPU) in response to the SAA Solicitation that threatens to industrialize our beaches and turn them into active construction sites with permanent high-voltage transmission infrastructure from offshore wind (OSW).

This letter does not constitute an endorsement or a rejection of OSW. Instead, this is a plea to protect our coastal communities and listen to our residents.

We call on the BPU to select projects that <u>do not</u> bury high-voltage cables under our beaches, parks, streets, or residential areas. The BPU should select projects that have the approval of the local community.

The fact is there are proposals that avoid this issue entirely and are appropriately zoned to accommodate high-voltage electrical transmission infrastructure where developers can work with the local community to avoid burying cables under beaches and other public property.

Please only select offshore wind transmission proposals that promote responsible development and avoid the unnecessary imposition on the use of public property.
