To Whom It May Concern:

On behalf of the New Jersey Business & Industry Association, the nation's largest and most influential statewide business association, I am writing to support the petition of Ocean Wind to obtain certain easements and consents related to the Ocean Wind Project in Cape May County.

Under the law, this project clearly meets the statutory standard for approval by the Board. The easements and approvals sought are clearly "reasonably necessary for the construction or operation of the qualified offshore wind project or open access offshore wind transmission facility." Without these easements and approvals this project cannot commence.

New Jersey's carbon mitigation goals are tied to the development of offshore wind projects, and this is the first project to proceed. The Legislature recognized the need for an alternative process to allow for these easements and approvals to be approved, which is why this hearing and comment period are being held. This project clearly meets the statutory and the petition should be approved.

As a business association, NJBIA is also enthused with the economic opportunities the wind industry will bring to New Jersey. As the Bureau of Ocean Energy Management's recent released Draft Environmental Impact statement summarizes the public interest for Ocean Wind 1:

[T]here will be notable and measurable benefits to employment, economic output, infrastructure improvements, and community services, especially job training, because of offshore wind development.

"The long-term benefits of offshore wind projects are the medium-term (10 to 20 years) job market for offshore wind construction; long-term O & M [operations and maintenance] jobs (25 to 35 years); long-term tax revenues; long-term economic benefits of improved ports to and other industrial land areas; diversification of marine industries, especially in those areas dominated by recreation and tourism; and growth in a skilled marine construction workforce.

For all the above reasons, we ask the Board to approve the petition.
