PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that on May 31, 2024, New Jersey Natural Gas ("NJNG" or the "Company") filed a petition with the New Jersey Board of Public Utilities ("Board") seeking approval to implement a change to its Energy Efficiency ("EE") Rider F through which it recovers costs associated with EE Programs ("Programs") offered through the Board-approved SAVEGREENTM Program. The Programs provide EE offerings for residential, commercial, and industrial customers, including special resources for low to moderate income customers. The Programs include discounted energy saving measures, grants, financing opportunities, technical assistance, and other resources to help address barriers to saving energy and making investments in energy efficiency improvements more accessible for all customers. Pursuant to various Board Orders in Docket Nos. 6012070640. G014121412. G018030355. and G020090622, NJNG is authorized to recover all reasonable and prudent costs associated with the SAVEGREEN™ programs. The budgets approved by various Board Orders and proposed costs include funds for grants, customer incentives and the associated incremental operations and maintenance expenses, along with associated carrying costs.

Rider F is applied with existing components and processes of the Board-approved Societal Benefits Charge applicable to all jurisdictional throughputs. The current after-tax EE charge for natural gas customers is \$0.0494 per therm, including New Jersey Sales and Use Tax ("SUT"). The Company has requested an increase of \$0.0011 per therm to the "EE Programs Established 2013-2018" component and an increase of \$0.0072 per therm to the "EE Triennium 1 Program" component for a total increase of \$0.0083 per therm effective October 1, 2024. If approved, the after-tax EE charge will increase to \$0.0577 per therm, including SUT. The change results in an overall increase of \$0.83, or 0.6 percent, on a typical 100-therm residential bill.

Rep. Pascrell Jr. dies, 87; served for nearly 30 years

Rep. Bill Pascrell Jr., the veteran Democrat who represented the Paterson area in Congress for nearly three decades, died Wednesday, his family confirmed. He was 87 years old.

A Paterson resident and its former mayor, Pascrell was first elected to Congress in 1996 and had served on the House Ways and Means Committee since 2007.

Feisty and outspoken, Pascrell embraced his image as a street-savvy Jersey tough guy who never walked away from a political fight. Pascrell, the son of a railroad traffic manager, prided himself on his many friendships with cops and firefighters.

The congressman was widely known for being an advocate for first responders, especially firefighters. He worked to bring grants back to his district and spearheaded the Firefighter Investment and Response Enhancement Act of 2000 to establish the only federal program that delivers grant dollars directly to fire departments across Amer-

Pascrell had recently had a 24-day hospitalization and needed what his staff said was "breathing assistance."

He was released, but then on Aug. 11 suffered a medical setback and was taken from a rehabilitation facility in Essex County to Cooperman Barnabas Medical Center in Livingston.

Pascrell was instrumental in getting his childhood playground, the Great Falls, recognized as the Paterson Great Falls National Historical Park during the administration of former President Barack Obama. He also served as co-chair of the Italian-American Congressional Delegation.

Pascrell's family posted Wednesday on the congressman's account on X, formerly called Twitter.


"It is with deep sadness that we announce that Bill Pascrell Jr., our beloved husband, father, and grandfather, passed away this morning," the family wrote. "As our United States Representative, Bill fought to his last breath to return to the job he cherished and to the people he loved.

"Bill lived his entire life in Paterson and had an unwavering love for the city he grew up in and served," the family said. "He is now at peace after a lifetime devoted to our great nation America."

2012 election battle

Pascrell had a streak of 14 congressional election victories at the time he died, perhaps none of them quite as impressive as his win in 2012, when redistricting set up a primary battle between him and fellow Democratic incumbent Steve Rothman. Boosted by a strong turnout in Paterson, Pascrell emerged the winner over Rothman with about 61% of the vote.

Pascrell faced a primary challenge this past June, but he easily fended off Prospect Park Mayor Mohamed Khairullah by winning 76% of the vote. Much of Khairullah's support came from the

North Jersey Islamic community, which had been critical of Pascrell's response to the conflict between Israel and Ha-

The congressman was going to face Republican Billy Prempeh of Paterson whom he had beaten twice before - in the November general election.

Before making his way to Washington, Pascrell served in the state Assembly and then as the mayor of Paterson. He also served in the U.S. Army and the Army Reserve, receiving an honorable discharge in 1967.

Life in Paterson

Pascrell attended St. George's Elementary School in Paterson and St. John the Baptist High School, where was chairman of the student council's advertising committee and, for a time, its president. Out of the classroom, he was an all-league third baseman for St. John's in his senior year, but Pascrell played a variety of positions including pitcher, catcher and outfielder.

After becoming the first in his family to graduate from high school, Pascrell studied at Fordham University. There, he received a bachelor's degree in journalism and a master's degree in philoso-

He started his career as a high school history teacher in Paterson, then taught in Paramus and later became an adjunct professor at Fairleigh Dickinson University. While teaching in Paramus in the 1960s, Pascrell spent time as the Democratic leader of Paterson's 10th Ward. During the decade, he was living on East 21st Street and occupying roles including chairman of the Social and Political Action Committee of the Association of Career Teachers and president of the Paterson Action Committee, which he co-founded to break what he thought was a party patronage mill under former and future Paterson Mayor Frank X.

'The city is finished with partisan politics," Pascrell declared in 1969. "Too many forces divide the city."

Pascrell is survived by his wife, Elsie, three children and five grandchildren.

Rutgers suspends Palestinian group that led campus protests

Rutgers University has issued a oneyear suspension for one of the groups that led spring protests against the war in Gaza and a four-day encampment on its New Brunswick campus.

The New Brunswick chapter of Students for Justice in Palestine has been banned from participating in campus activities for the coming academic year, after the university said it violated terms of an earlier probation, said an emailed statement from Rutgers.

The university also announced a series of other policies on campus protests this week, including a ban on the type of encampments that sprang up at Rutgers and other U.S. colleges earlier this year. The New Brunswick action disbanded peacefully after the school agreed to steps including meeting with protesters to discuss their demand that the university divest from companies tied to Israel, though Rutgers didn't commit to

withdrawing funds.

Rutgers said its suspension of SJP will last until "at least July 4, 2025." The fall semester is scheduled to begin Sept.

"During this period SJP is not recognized by the university and cannot reserve rooms, participate in campus activities, join intramural sports or serve on councils," Dory Devlin, a Rutgers spokesperson, said in the statement.

In response to a request for comment, SJP referred NorthJersey.com to social media posts from the group that detailed Rutgers' new speech policies.

Rutgers' new guidelines on free expression

In a new "Free Expression at Rutgers" webpage launched Tuesday, the university said it is "committed to the freedom of speech" but also would "preserve the right of all in our community to learn, teach, and carry out the university's es-

Among the guidelines:

- Individuals who want to hold protests are required to submit notification forms at least three days before the scheduled demonstration and obtain a
- Demonstrations must not disrupt academic or business operations of the university and must be held in a field that has been designated for protests on
 - Encampments are not permitted.
- Individuals may demonstrate and/ or pass out leaflets outside when there is a speaker or program but must be within a designated area established by the University Police Department to prevent disruption of the scheduled event.
- Demonstrators are not permitted to hinder the ability of participants to enter or exit programs.

The suspension was lifted in January, but Rutgers also imposed a oneyear probation period.

Tensions on campus have risen since the Oct. 7 Hamas attack on Israel, in which 1,200 people were killed and 250 hostages were taken to Gaza. Israel's subsequent campaign in Gaza has killed roughly 40,000, according to the Hamas-run Gaza Health Ministry.

Some Jewish students have reported feeling unsafe and threatened by the protests on campus. Pro-Palestinian organizers, meanwhile, have chafed at what they say are unfair restrictions that limit free speech.

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that, pursuant to the Electric Discount and Energy Competition Act, N.J.S.A. 48:3-49, et seq., the Universal Service Fund ("USF") program was established by the New Jersey Board of Public Utilities (the "Board"), to provide funds to assist qualifying low-income individuals in paying their energy bills. Pursuant to Board Orders dated April 30, 2003, July 16, 2003, and June 22, 2005, the State's electric and gas public utilities' Societal Benefits Charge ("SBC") includes recovery of funding for the USF program through uniform statewide rates. The SBC also includes funding for the Lifeline Program, which provides assistance with heating costs to qualifying elderly and disabled persons and incorporates funds for the Work First New Jersey program.

The State of New Jersey's Department of Community Affairs is the Administrator of the USF Program, and the New Jersey Department of Human Services is the Administrator of the Lifeline programs and authorizes the disbursement of benefits to eligible customers in the respective programs.

On June 28, 2024, New Jersey Natural Gas Company ("NJNG" or the "Company") made a compliance filing with the Board requesting authority to implement an increase related to the statewide USF/Lifeline program component of the SBC, as described below, to be effective on October 1, 2024 ("Filing"). The current after-tax USF/Lifeline program charge for natural gas customers is \$0.0177 per therm. Based on the Filing, the proposed USF component would increase by \$0.0101 per therm and the proposed Lifeline component would decrease by \$0.0020 per therm. Pascrell championed causes meant to promote fairness

A native son of Paterson, the late Bill Pascrell Jr. spent more than 27 years in Congress after decades of involvement in New Jersey politics.

During that span, Pascrell championed a series of causes meant to promote fairness, create opportunity and ensure justice for all.

Pascrell, said many contemporaries offering condolences after his death in a

Livingston hospital on Wednesday, was a steadfast advocate for middle-class Americans. He used his notable positions on the House Ways and Means and the Democratic Steering and Policy committees to influence critical economic policies, including on Social Security, taxes, Medicare, health policy and international trade.

Rep. Josh Gottheimer, of Wyckoff, called Pascrell "an absolute giant, a courageous fighter and an unparalleled champion of hardworking families and first responders."

Gov. Phil Murphy also recognized Pascrell's efforts to enact beneficial legislation for Americans.

"At every stage of his congressional career, he stood up for our neighbors by defending access to reproductive health care, keeping our communities safe from gun violence, supporting our law enforcement officers and first responders, protecting our natural wonders like Paterson's Great Falls — and so much more." Murphy said.

A nationally recognized leader in fire safety, Pascrell authored the Firefighter Investment and Response Enhancement (FIRE) Act of 2000, which established a federal grant program to provide critical funding for fire departments across the country. He also spearheaded the Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) grant program to help fire departments and volunteer firefighter interest organizations increase or maintain trained firefighters in their communi-

"A lot of immigrants don't want anyone to know because it might have consequences to their job, to their relationships, to their family," Chen said. "The problem is people don't get tested and then it becomes a much bigger problem."

Asians make up about half of the 1 million people in the U.S. with chronic hepatitis B and are eight times more likely to die from the disease than Caucasians, according to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

The most highly impacted groups are immigrants from China, Korea, Vietnam and Pacific Islands where hepatitis B has long circulated and infant immunization rates are low, according to the Hepatitis B Foundation.

Because it has few symptoms and is called the "silent infection," many people don't know they have hepatitis B until more serious problems develop. The virus, which spreads via blood and bodily fluids, infects the liver and can lead to cirrhosis and cancer.

It can circulate within families because it is easily passed down from mother to child, which is why the first dose of hepatitis B vaccine is given within the first 24 hours of birth in the U.S. For foreign-born Americans, that means testing must be a priority since anti-viral medications can slow its ability to damage the liver, experts say.

"There are far too many people living undiagnosed and, therefore, untreated for hepatitis," said Dr. Kaitlan Baston, the state health commissioner. "Getting tested is the only way to know if you have hepatitis so you can get available

treatments."

Focus on screening, treatment and adult vaccinations

Many hospitals are making forays into the state's burgeoning Asian community, which makes up about 11% to 12% of New Jersey's population — one of the highest percentages in the nation along with California, New York and Hawaii.

Screening, treatment and even adult vaccinations are a big focus of Englewood Health's Asian Health and Wellness center. The staff at the center in Englewood Cliffs sometimes have to appeal to patients to be screened because of the stigma surrounding the virus.

"Diseases and chronic conditions, including hepatitis B, are often seen as shameful, leading to denial or avoidance of medical care," said Dr. Samuel Bae, a gastroenterologist at Englewood Health.

The center's staff speak Korean and hopefully it will help more people."

Chinese, which "greatly aids in educating those who might be hesitant to discuss certain health issues," Bae said. "Thankfully, younger generations of [Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders] tend to be more open and proactive about addressing these health concerns."

A professor of molecular biology at Rutgers Robert Wood Johnson Medical School, Jacki Chen began feeling unusually tired after a day spent standing in the classroom and laboratory. He knew hepatitis B ran in his family when his brother, A-kun, developed liver cancer in Taiwan from the virus in the early 1990s. It was caught early and, with a combination of surgery and treatment, it was brought under control.

Chen was tested and came back positive. He began antiviral medication right away since he was at a high risk for liver cancer given his family history. His wife, Melody, tested positive too. When she became pregnant, she took antiviral medicine in her last trimester, and their son, Leif, was immunized right away. He has never developed hepatitis B.

Chen began to learn that more friends in his native Taiwan and closer to his home in Princeton had hepatitis B. So he did what many do to reach the greatest amount of people: he took to social media.

Chen created a Facebook page to share advice and offer support to hepatitis B sufferers. It has grown to 13,000 members worldwide.

"Our advice is pretty much, if you're healthy, you need to be screened and monitored," he said. "If you are positive, you need to get treatment. All we can do is offer support and recommend a doctor, but that's what a lot of these people need.

Chen launched a nonprofit group last year in the U.S. called the Taiwan Hepatitis Information & Care Association that he hopes will appeal to immigrants from the island nation and all Asian Americans. Chen, along with friends and family, has gone to Capitol Hill to ask New Jersey's congressional delegation — most notably Sen. Cory Booker's staff — to lobby for more funding into hepatitis B research.
